Over the last half-century the Kellogg Company has deliberately built a reputation as a first-class employer,

a pillar of the community and a good corporate citizen. Along with its involvement with the W.K. Kellogg Foundation and the WKKF Trust, Kellogg is involved in philanthropic and charitable efforts to feed, clothe, shelter and educate poor and vulnerable children and youth.

But actions speak louder than words,

and its actions over the last fifteen years show that Kellogg looks more like a large Wall St. bully, than a kind, benevolent employer. Gone is the cereal

company based in Battle Creek that reinvested profits and treated employees like they were part of the Kellogg family. In its place is a \$14 billion dollar global snack giant spanning the globe that puts profit ahead of people; funnels those profits to its wealthiest shareholders; and leaves communities and families devastated in its wake.

Kellogg's new legacy: Longtime workers thrown to the street. Families without health insurance. Announced plant closings before Christmas. Communities left empty. Children left with nowhere to turn. Jobs shifted to low-wage countries.

This is not the legacy that W.K. Kellogg would have wanted.







